
New exhibits blos-

MUSEUM CELEBRATES EUREKA'S BIRTHDAY

In 1856, Eureka Incorporated, and now the Clarke Museum is an active part of the 150th Birthday celebrations. In January, we opened an exhibit that highlights Eureka's early years, and also has a display of birthday cards that spans several decades. Photos and paintings of Eureka and Humoldt, early documents, clothing and artifacts are included. The exhibit is partly housed in elegant cases made possible by a grant from the Humboldt Area Foundation and by the skilled carpentry of Board Member Roger Smith.

This exhibit will run for all of 2006, and throughout the year the Clarke will be involved in many community celebrations. One of our main roles will be directing the time capsule project. For this, community members will be asked to bring in items typical of the year 2006. These will be sealed away to be opened in 2056 at the celebration of Eureka's 200th anniversary. The official announcement of this project will be at the city kick-off celebration at the Adorni Center on April 22. The capsule will be closed at the end of December, so between now and then think about what you would like Eurekans in fifty years to know about our time and our town. Contributions to the capsule will be collected at the Clarke and other locations.
