


Summer 2012 Quarterly Publication

Announcing Two New Exhibits

Fishing Tales

We are reeling in the summer with a new exhibit on fishing. On display are tales of Native American fishing traditions, whaling, recreational and commercial fishing, and artwork inspired by the salmon run. The focus of this exhibit is to explore different perspectives and tell some of the many stories about what fishing means to Humboldt County.

The exhibit includes a display created by the Wiyot Tribe on traditional Native American fishing, and artwork commemorating the salmon run on the Eel River by renowned local artist Michael Guerriero. Historic photos, harpoons, commercial products related to the whaling industry, and fishing equipment from the Clarke Museum's collection complete the exhibit. Tourists and locals alike will find much to see about the rich history of fishing on the North Coast.

Railroad and Logging

Logging and trains are an important part of this region's history and are the focus of a new exhibit. Although pioneers to this region had been logging since the first summer of their arrival, they were limited to trees that loggers could cut, animals could move, and mills could saw. In the decades to follow, technological advances made the larger trees fair game. The first steam locomotive came to Humboldt in 1875 to haul logs on a newly completed railroad extending up Salmon Creek from Humboldt Bay. In 1881 John Dolbeer introduced his innovative "steam donkey," a mobile winch that could drag logs out of the woods over terrain which even the toughest oxen would not attempt. Together, logging railroads and steam-powered yarding ushered in the era of "highball logging," when virgin redwood forests throughout the region yielded to the overwhelming power of mechanized harvesting. 

Lake school teacher presented us with a cardboard box that contained the documents, letters and photos of a HC pioneer family. The schoolteacher's brother, a trash collector in Pacific Grove, California had, during the performance of his duties, noted the Humboldt County origin of the materials within the box and removed it from the flow toward oblivion. He mailed it to his sister who brought it to us.

The family was the Cuddeback family from which a small Humboldt County town derived its name. The original HC Cuddebacks, Henry and Martha, hailed from Ohio and Wisconsin, respectively. Henry first came West as a gold prospector, c. 1849, and probably met his wife-to-be via another gold seeker, Jesse Pease, her father. They mar-

ried in 1853 in Wisconsin. Henry returned to the gold fields in 1854, but it wasn't until 1862 that Martha arrived in Humboldt County. By then, Henry had bought a farm located between the Van Duzen River and Yager Creek. There, the Cuddebacks prospered and raised eight children. Roof Raising Fundraiser

Interested in celebrating the 100th anniversary of the Bank of Eureka Building with the Clarke Historical Museum? Many people in Humboldt have already donated to the roof fund, and the museum is more than halfway to our goal. If you would like to donate to the fund you'll be invited to an exclusive, after-hours party on Saturday, October 13th as a reward for your generosity. As any recent visitor to the museum has noticed, this leak has caused a great deal of damage to the main hall's south-facing wall. After receiving several estimates from roofing contractors, the museum has developed a plan and now needs the funds to complete the project before the rainy season begins.

In 1982 the National Trust for Historic Preservation included the Clarke Museum building in the National Register of Historic Places. Originally constructed for the Bank of Eureka, the Clarke is in a Classical Revival building designed by noted San Francisco architect Albert Pissis. He designed more than 35 major buildings in California, most of them in San Francisco, which makes his work all the more unique to Humboldt County. The building was the first Class A fireproof building in northwestern California. According to Humboldt Times the bank opened on July 15, 1912 and to honor this centennial anniversary the museum must repair the roof of this historic building.


The Bank of Eureka building has been the Clarke Museum's home since 1960. The museum needs \$3,000 to repair the leak, and \$15,000 to repair the noticeable paint and plaster damage. 
